Everything was beautiful! We then began doing direct service in the community at a local university where we built a black water treatment system! The following day, we worked alongside the community of Pinar Que Mado, who had never had running,



clean water before. We built and finished an aqueduct that brought clean water to the community. We also spent a few days traveling around, visiting beautiful beaches and white water rafting! The entire experience taught me types of service I could bring back to my club, that would have a lasting impact in my community. I made amazing friends that I still talk to everyday, even though they live all the way across the country. This was by far the best experience that I have ever had!

### Q&A with Governor Morgan Yelverton



**As we loose members who are seniors, how do we encourage new members to join?**

Membership can be a difficult concept to master. Most schools have a lot of clubs and students tend to have other extracurricular activities outside of school, as well. In addition to the tips that I mentioned in the "Tips to Membership" article (page 4), my next big piece of advice is to give potential members an experience that they will want to come back to. **When we are faced with difficulties among our board, like say someone isn't doing their job, what is the best way to handle it?**

Most board issues result from a miscommunication or misunderstanding of the board member responsibilities. Therefore, take the time to explain the specifics of what each board member is expected to do. In addition, take the time to work one-on-one with each board member to perfect the skills required for the position. Membership recruitment is vital in Key Club, as a fourth of our membership leaves every year! Here are some interesting things to do to gain interest in your club:


Attend and use Fall Rally as a recruitment tool.

Kiwanis One Day is a great way to bring together the Kiwanis Family, and focus on service to the community. ### Dues

Dues are mandatory and are necessary to Key Club! District and International dues pay for membership material (pins, ID cards, etc.), marketing, training, District and club awards, the Key Club Magazine, club mailings, and scholarships. So, as your clubs are paying dues, please remember...



The Early Bird Deadline is November 1st.

The Required Deadline is December 1st.

Dues must be at least \$13.50, but cannot exceed \$20.50.

You must have a Membership Update Center account to pay.



To pay dues, please follow these easy steps:

1. Go to [keyclub.org/muc](http://keyclub.org/muc). This is to access the Membership Update Center.
2. If the advisor already has an account, have them enter their email and password. If they do not have an account, they will need to press the "Register/Reset Password."

### Youth Opportunities Fund (YOF)

Has your Key Club had a fantastic service project idea, but do not have the financial resources to fulfill it? The Youth Opportunities Fund is a program from Key Club International that sets out money for

clubs like yours so that your Key Club can make a difference in your community. When applying for the grant, it's important to remember the following: the application must be filled out completely

or else it will not be considered, the application must be turned in before **October 15th at 11:59 p.m.** or it will not be considered, and the application should be detailed but concise.

### Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF

Trick-or-Treat (TOT) for UNICEF is one of the Eliminate Project's largest and most important campaigns to end maternal and neonatal tetanus (MNT). MNT is a deadly disease that kills women and children during childbirth. However, it is preventable. A vaccine to save a woman and all of her future children is only \$1.80. This is the perfect opportunity for your Key

Club to make a difference in their lives, and finally end MNT. This Halloween, instead of trick-or-treating for candy, trick-or-treat for donations! Let potential donors know what MNT is, and why you're collecting donations. You could say, "My name is \_\_\_\_\_, and I am a part of \_\_\_\_\_ Key Club, which is a student-led service organization! I am participating in Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF, and all donations collected are being used to eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus, which is a dead-



ly disease that harms mothers and newborns during childbirth. For

only \$1.80, which is less than the cost of a bag of candy, you can provide a vaccine which protects the mom and all of her future children. Would you be interested in donating?" If they are willing to donate, they can put it in a TOT for UNICEF box, which can be ordered from the Kiwanis store. If your club is able to raise more than \$250 by December 31st, they'll receive a special banner patch!





## Terry Sanford High School: Dog Toys

The Terry Sanford High School Key Club recently came together to complete a service project in their community. Each member gathered up old t-shirts and made dog toys by braiding the cut shirt. The club made about 50 dog toys and
