Working with Faculty and Kiwanis Advisors

Faculty and Kiwanis Advisors play a huge and vital role in the well-being of our organization. For without them, as the saying goes, "nothing would be possible." As your clubs begin to prepare for the upcoming Key Club year, please keep these tips in mind for working with your Faculty and Kiwanis Advisors:

Be aware of who the Faculty and Kiwanis Advisors are: Faculty Advisors are more than the teacher who has to stay after school in order for the Key Club to meet. Kiwanis Advisors are more than the person who occasionally attends your Key Club meetings. The only way to break this false belief, is by ensuring that your club members and officers are aware of the people who hold these vital positions.

Keep them in the loop: Its frustrating when there's a new infor-

mation going around but nobody will take the time to explain it to you. The same goes for your Faculty and Kiwanis Advisors. In order for them to best assist you and your club, it is essential that they know what is going on at all times. A huge portion of this, is taking the time to have verbal conversations with them. In addition to this, you could also try writing minutes for your board meetings and regular meetings. Just make sure that they also know as much about what's going on as you do!

Be patient and be flexible!: Being an Advisor is a lot of fun and it is also very rewarding. In addition to this, there are a lot of responsibilities that come with being an Advisor. Therefore, things are not always going to be done when you necessarily want them to be. Take the time to be patient

and flexible with your Advisors and know that they will get to things as soon as they can.

Always remember to say "Thank you!": Being a Faculty or Kiwanis Advisor is no one's full-time job. Therefore, take the time to say "Thank you." Clubs are not possible without the support and dedication of its Advisors. Whether it's a verbal "Thank you," a card, a cake, etc. the appreciation will go a long way.





How to Make Meetings Fun!

Meetings are a time for your club to plan and reflect for further service projects, in order to better serve your home, school, and community. Club members should be able to get the most out of their meeting experience.

However, sometimes it might seem difficult to plan every meeting in a way that is both informative and engaging. When you are in a situation that is similar to this one, take the time to brainstorm ideas with your

club officers and advisers on how to make meetings fun. Sometimes, the best solution is to look at sample agendas from other clubs. Here is a sample agenda for a typical club meeting:

Call to Order

1

I. Welcome! Make your club members feel appreciated for being there and give a brief overview of what your meeting activities will be.

II. Key Club Pledge and the Pledge of Allegiance. Both pledges are an important part of our organization and they are an easy way of getting your club members involved.

III. Roll Call. Find out who's attending your meetings! If you have too many members for a role call, simply pass around a sign-in sheet.



Minutes

2

Give a brief recap of what happened at the previous meeting. Club secretaries are typically the one to write and deliver such reports.



Program

3

Here's your chance to get the club members really involved! Plan an icebreaker so that your members can get the chance to learn more about each other. This is also the time where you can invite guest speakers to come in and speak to your club. Get a speaker to discuss the latest volunteer opportunity or reach out to your local Aktion Club President. Any speaker will add a new and vibrant discussion to your meeting's atmosphere.

Old/Continued Business

4

Discuss club items that were discussed in the previous meetings (reminders) and bring up any discussions that were not finalized.

New Business

5

Share all of the new and exciting things that are coming up for the club. Also, take the time to make any new plans that are necessary to continue improving the club.

Adjournment

6

Thank the members for coming and take any questions or concerns that they might have.



Keep in mind that this is just a sample of what your club meetings can look like. There is truly no right or wrong way to run a meeting. Just be sure that members are getting a glimpse of the full member experience!



Taking Advantage of your District Board

The Carolinas District Board is comprised of an Executive Board and 34 LTGS. More specifically, the Executive Board includes: the District Governor, Secretary, Treasurer, and Editor. The Executive Board is always available to serve and assist the District in any way possible. Each Executive Officer



has question topics that they are the most educated in. The District Editor is most useful for discussing your club's social media accounts and newsletters. The District Treasurer is most useful to questions related to club dues and the Membership Update Center. The District Secretary is most useful for questions related to keeping in contact with the District through the use of contact information. The District Governor is most useful for any and all miscellaneous questions that do not fit the category of any of the other Executive Board Officers. Each LTG is assigned to a specific division within the District. Divisions are created by group-

ing clubs that are in a similar geographical boundary. Lieutenant Governors work on a more one-on-one basis with individual clubs by visiting clubs, sending emails, holding President Council Meetings, hosting Divisional Events, etc. Lieutenant Governors are a club's best source for all things Key Club and the Carolinas District. The most important thing to remember is that the District Board is here to serve you! We are always available for any questions, concerns, or support that you might need. Invitations


Invitations are an exciting thing to receive. They are a personal request of your presence at something. Get your club officers together to create enough personal invitations, for your next Key Club meeting, for every student in your school. The invitations are sure to spark a lot of interest in students.



Listen to Students!

Sometimes the best way to get new members, is just by listening to what students in your school have to say. Find out what interests them and then connect their interests to Key Club.

Announcements



At most schools, announcements are typically how the school day begins. Whether the announcements come over the intercom, on the school TVs, or simply by word of mouth by the teacher, they are a great way of getting useful information out to the school. Make the announcements memorable, but also informative.

Hold an Interest Meeting

Joining a club may be a lot of pressure. The club that every student joins, is what they plan on staying involved with most throughout the upcoming school year. Take that pressure off of students by holding an interest meeting. Have snacks available, play games, and most importantly share what Key Club is all about! At the end of the meeting, be sure to discuss how students can join Key Club and take contact information to send follow-ups.



MAKE ACCOMMODATIONS FOR MEMBERS

Accommodations are often necessary to generate new members. Maybe you have a lot of students that do activities after school. To accommodate this, you could move your club meetings to the morning. In order to find out about all of the necessary accommodations, consider publishing a survey at the beginning of the club year.

As you find your own personal methods of Key Club membership recruitment, remember that throughout our organization, we strive to serve the club member first. Your leadership to your club helps tremendously in this manner. Now go out and find the next Key Club members!

Role of Club Secretary


As the year of service begins, so do your duties as club secretary! If you have not sent your club officer contact information to your Lieutenant Governor yet, be sure to do so now! Every month you are also required to submit a club monthly report to track your club's progress. You can then use these reports to compile your annual achievement reports in March, the end of our service year. The club monthly report recently changed to become more user friendly and also allows you more freedom as to what you would like to report and what you wouldn't like to report. Make sure you visit our District's website for the most up to date form. Also, as the year

begins, be sure to create some sort of database with all of your members' information on it. This will allow your president, advisor, and you to contact members of your club more effectively. As always, effective communication equals effective service. It is also the club secretary's job to take minutes and notes at each club and officer meeting. This way, you will have a recording of everything that was discussed in case you need to refer back to it later.



DON'T FORGET

Submit your club's monthly report by the 10th of every month at carolinaskeyclub.org under the "Reports" tab.



Lastly, be sure to speak up at your club meetings. You were elected to voice the opinions of your club and to help run it as smoothly as possible. As a leader of our organization, we rely on you to be our change makers. We are the largest service organization not because of what our International President believes, but because of what you, the club member and club officer, initiate. Thank you for your service!



Club Roster Collection

It's that time of year again: club roster collection! As we begin a new year of service, the District must renew its database of contact information! Your Lieutenant Governor is relying on you to provide them with accurate and detailed contact information. This information will be used to better the communication within our District. Kiwanis Family Conference

Kiwanis is a service organization for adults. Founded in 1915, Kiwanis is still serving others, 101 years later. Kiwanis now acts as the parent organization to our four service leadership programs (SLP): K-Kids, Builders Club, Key Club, Circle K, and Aktion Club. Together, we make up the Kiwanis Family. Kiwanis Family Conference is an annual event, held at the YMCA Blue Ridge Assembly in Black Mountain, NC, that connects the Kiwanis Family. This year, Kiwanis Family Conference will be November 4-6. Throughout the weekend, participants will do group exercises, bonding experiences, and



leadership building activities together. Participants can stargaze, hike, and see the stunning views of neighboring valleys and ridges, streams, and beautiful flowers in their free time. Registration packets will be available shortly on the Carolinas District Key Club website, carolinas-keyclub.org. Amendments Made at International Convention

During the annual Key Club International Convention, the House of Delegates convenes to elect international officers that will lead our organization into new territories, literally and figuratively, and also considers amendments to our bylaws. Originally, there were four amendments that were submitted to the House of Delegates however, only one was actually considered by the delegates. Amendment one was voted on prior to the House of Delegates by the Key Club International

Board and has already been sent to Kiwanis International for approval. Three more amendments were submitted by Manatee High School of the Florida District, but two were rescinded before the start of the House of Delegates. This left only amendment two up for debate. Amendment two stated that one geographical location cannot be encompassed by more than one District. In layman terms, this amendment would merge the California Nevada Hawaii District with the Cali-

fornia-Nevada-Hawaii KIWINIS District. After multiple extensions of debate, calls for recounts, and calls for voting by paper ballot, amendment two did not pass.

The CALI-NEV-HA District will not absorb the CALI-NEV-HA KIWINIS District for the 2016-2017 service year.

Membership Dues

As your District Treasurer, one of my main responsibilities is to make sure that Key Clubs around our District are in good standing, and that they are considered active. To be an active Key Club, all members must pay their dues, and there must be at least fifteen members. Dues must be more than \$13.50, and cannot exceed \$20.50. Of the \$13.50 paid, \$7 of the dollars go to Key Club International, and the remaining \$6 go to the Carolinas District. Your dues money is used to

produce training material, membership material, and mailings. Members must pay their dues before the deadline, and are encouraged to pay early. The early bird deadline is November 1st, and the final deadline is December 1st. If you have any questions about dues, please feel free to contact your Lieutenant Governor or myself.



Fall Rally Registration

Fall Rally is sure to be a day full of fun, fellowship, and friends at Carowinds! As our District's premiere event, you do not want to miss it! Key Club members and non-Key Club members alike will be uniting at Carowinds for a morning full of Key Club, and an afternoon full of coasters. When you register for Fall Rally, you will register as one club. This means that individual members will need to turn in their money to the club, and once everyone that wants to go has paid, your club will send one check as well as the registration



sheet to the address listed on the registration packet. Registration packets will be available on the Carolinas District Key Club website, carolinas-keyclub.org. Inside of the registration packet you will be able to find out more on the price of the event, incentives, and what convention will entail. However, if you have any additional questions or concerns, I encourage you to ask your Lt. Governor.



Role of Club Treasurer

If you are a newly elected officer, congratulations! You're in for a year of fun, but also one full of responsibility. As a Key Club officer, you are a role model to those who serve in your club, and you are expected to give your time to improve your home, school, and community. As a Key Club Treasurer, you are financially responsible for your club. Some of the things you will be in charge of is collecting dues, organizing fund-

raisers, and balancing your club's account. You will need to work closely with your school treasurer, as well as your Key Club Faculty Advisor and Kiwanis Advisor. One of your first tasks in the school year will be turning in dues. Every member must pay at least \$13.50, but no more than \$20.50. Dues are important to Key Club, because they provide the resources vital to growing and strengthening our organization. For a club,

dues can be used to buy supplies for a service project, donate money to a preferred charity, etc. If you have any questions on being club treasurer, reach out to your Faculty Advisor, Lieutenant Governor, myself, or check out keyclub.org/leadership/bal.



Youth Opportunities Fund (YOF)

Has your Key Club had a fantastic service project idea, but do not have the financial resources to fulfill it? The Youth Opportunities Fund is a program from Key Club International that sets out money for clubs like yours so that your Key Club can make a difference in your community. For the past few years, fifty cents

of the seven dollars in dues each member paid would be put in an endowment fund, and the interest made would be what was used for the fund, which totals approximately \$50,000. Any club can apply for the fund, and are encouraged to do so. When applying for the grant it's important to remember the following: the

application must be filled out completely or else it will not be considered, the application must be turned in before **October 15th at 11:59 p.m.** or it will not be considered, and the application should be detailed but concise.
